The Meaning of Matariki

Matariki is the Māori name for the cluster of stars also known as the Pleiades. It rises in midwinter and is closely connected with the maramataka (the Māori lunar calendar). The reappearance of the Matariki stars in the early morning sky brings the past year to a close and marks the beginning of the new year.

Mātauranga Māori (ancestral knowledge and wisdom) is at the heart of celebrations of Matariki. Historically, the stars of Matariki were also closely tied to planting, harvesting and hunting. If the stars appeared clear and bright, it signified an abundant season ahead. Matariki is a time for remembering and honouring those who have been lost since the last rising of Matariki. A time to gather together, to connect and be thankful and a time to look to the future and plan for the year ahead.
